

REVIEW THE PROMPT AND PLAN

This unit is designed to build argument writing skills.

An argument essay seeks to convince the reader to accept the writer's position or proposal.

1. Reread the **prompt**.

Think of a policy at your school that needs to change or a new policy that should be implemented.

Write an argument for your choice.

2. Review the **plan** developed yesterday.

↻ Is the **topic** clear?

↻ Is the **claim** clear?

Is there a definite **position** or **proposal**?

↻ Are **reasons** and/or **evidence** provided?

3. Note changes or additions to the plan at the right.



LEARN THE TARGET

INTRODUCTION ESTABLISHES THE CLAIM

↻ The introduction is usually the first paragraph of the essay.

↻ The topic is named in the introduction.

- The topic is often a problem or concern of some kind.

- The author gives background information about the topic.

↻ The **claim** is the author's statement about the topic.

- The claim is often a **proposal** for changing something.

↻ The claim is important to the reader because...

- It tells the reader the purpose of the paper. The purpose is to convince the reader.

- It establishes the importance or **urgency** of the paper.

- It signals the reader to look for reasons and evidence to support the claim.

- It allows the reader to think about his or her opinion about the topic.

↻ Read and think about the introduction paragraph from the anchor text on the next page.

claim (noun)

A claim is a statement of something as a fact.

Synonyms: assertion, contention, declaration

*The author's **claim** is that zoos are unhealthy environments for animals.*

proposal (noun)

A proposal is a suggestion or intention put forward.

Synonyms: plan, proposition, request, suggestion

*Her **proposal** is to save energy by supporting carpooling.*

urgency (noun)

Urgency is the quality or condition of seriousness.

Synonyms: importance, necessity, need

*The greatest **urgency** is to alert citizens when tornadoes occur.*
